Most parents can't give their children a lavish inheritance, but every parent will leave a **personal legacy**. Too often, parents believe the end goal is to make their kids happy. There are moments when I will buy anything, do anything, and go anywhere if it will just make my kids happy. Parents don't like it when their kids are in a bad mood. Things are just easier when everybody is happy. You are happy when they are happy, so you'll watch a blue dog on television, eat McNuggets, buy pet turtles, listen to the Wiggles, and mortgage your house if their happiness is at stake. You don't want them to be spoiled; **you just want them to be happy**.

I have learned that some things are beyond my capacity. I have lived through several stages of parenting. I learned to lean on a principle we refer to as "**imagine the end**." The fog usually begins to lift when I mentally fast-forward to the final chapter of my children's lives and ask a pointed question: **Who do I really want them to become?** I know that in the middle of that answer is an understanding of who God is. Then I imagine the end and remember that God is writing His narrative.

When it comes to my children, the most difficult thing I have ever done is to admit my limited capacity and trust God to show up and do what only He can do. Some days I just need to be reminded that my family is a bigger picture and that God desires to demonstrate His redemptive power through us.
